The next time you're at your child's therapy clinic, stop for a moment and look around the waiting room. Who do you see? The siblings, the ones who wait in the lobby week after week alongside their caregivers while their brother or sister spends hours each week in therapy. These are the siblings who walk along side their brother/sister every single day while often wondering why are we here, how much longer, am I the only one who has to do this because meaning the stop of the stop o

one who has to do this because my friends don't, what is my brother or sister doing here?

Siblings will most likely be in the lives of family members with special needs longer than anyone. Siblings will be there after parents are gone and special education services are a distant memory. If they are provided with support and information, they can help their siblings from childhood to their senior years.

Throughout their lives, siblings share many of the concerns that parents of children with special needs experience, including isolation, a need for information, guilt, concerns about the future, and caregiving demands. Siblings also face issues that are uniquely theirs including resentment, peer issues, embarrassment, and pressure to achieve.

A support group for siblings known as Sibshops is being launched by Family Achievement Foundation in Woodbury in Spring 2023. Currently, Minnesota has two registered Sibshops, located at Mayo Clinic and Children's Hospital. In the United States, there are over 32 million people who have disabilities and/or mental health concerns. Most of these people have typically developing brothers and sisters. Siblings want to be heard and validated and it's time to support the sibs!

Sibshops are opportunities for siblings of children with disabilities to obtain peer support and education within a recreational context. They reflect the agencies commitment to the well-being of the family member most likely to have the longest-lasting relationship with the person with a disability.

The goals of Sibshops are to meet other sibs while having fun and playing games, talk about the good, and not-so-good parts of having a sibling with special needs with others who get it, learn about the services their sibs may receive, and learn how other siblings handle sticky sibling situations.

Who attends Sibshops? Siblings and just the siblings.



SPOTLIGHT ON MIRACLE LEAGUE

Looking for a fun summer inclusive activity for your child...and for yourself too? Miracle League is an organization that removes barriers that keep children (3-18 years old) who have cognitive and/or physical disabilities from experiencing and participating in baseball. It is also about making friends and boosting self-esteem. The league uses a "buddy system" which pairs players up with volunteers, although you or a family member are also welcome to be your child's buddy. Not only do the children benefit, but it is a welcoming environment for the parents to meet other parents while cheering not only your own child, but the entire field of players!

Miracle League started in Georgia about 23 years ago. Currently, there are over 240 Miracle Leagues across the USA and in other countries. Our local branch is called East Metro Miracle League. It recently celebrated its 10 year anniversary. Participation continues to grow as it started with 65 players in 2012 and last summer over 100 players took part in the league.

Our local East Metro Miracle League plays games at a specially designed Woodbury Rotary Miracle Field at M Health Fairview Sports Center.
